## Call to order 10:00 - Barbara Weir - Burlington County

#### I. Participant Picture – Mark Van Kampen

- The Participant Picture where everything starts. Found under the Programs/PA tab in Legacy and Programs Tab in NexGen.
- Make sure the data is accurate on the Participant Record, before adding any activities or services to a customer's record.
- All values need to be accurate for reporting purposes. If using Adult funds, need to make sure the customer is low-income, basic skills deficient, an English Language Learner, or on Public Assistance within 6 months before participation.
- Changing the record will not update the original snapshot; you must go into the Participant Record and change it.
- Mark will make the presentation and a tutorial on how to change the picture available to the group.

### II. OSOS Updates – Kamlesh Patel

- The test server was down so there was no testing.
- RFP is complete, in the Q & A phase. Still on track to have a new vendor in place to build the new application for OSOS by early next year.

## III. WIOA Program Oversight & Development – John Bicica

- All monitoring is concluded. No findings, just observations with recommendations.
- Referring to CFR 680.210 Who may receive training services? There must be
  documentation in OSOS to note *customer is unable to obtain other funding* before use of WIOA
  funds.

Are unable to obtain grant assistance from other sources to pay the costs of such training, including such sources as State-funded training funds, Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA), and Federal Pell Grants established under title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, or require WIOA assistance in addition to other sources of grant assistance, including Federal Pell Grants (provisions relating to fund coordination are found at § 680.230 and WIOA sec. 134(c)(3)(B).

• Data validation also concluded with no issues. However, keep in mind eligibility for High School Graduates (only barrier) – must also be low-income and either basic skills deficient or an English Language Learner; per the Out-of-School Youth Eligibility. See #3 below.

An out-of-school youth (OSY) is an individual who is:

- (a) Not attending any school (as defined under State law);
- (b) Not younger than 16 or older than age 24 at time of enrollment. Because age eligibility is based on age at enrollment, participants may continue to receive services beyond the age of 24 once they are enrolled in the program; and
- (c) **One** or more of the following:
  - (1) A school dropout;
  - (2) A youth who is within the age of compulsory school attendance, but has not attended school for at least the most recent complete school year calendar quarter. School year calendar quarter is based on how a local school district defines its school year quarters. In cases where schools do not use quarters, local programs must use calendar year quarters;
  - (3) A recipient of a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent who is a low-income individual and is either basic skills deficient or an English language learner;
  - (4) An offender;
  - (5) A homeless individual (as defined in sec. 41403(6) of the Violence Against Women Act of 1994, a homeless child or youth (as defined in sec. 725(2) of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, or a runaway;
  - (6) An individual in foster care or who has aged out of the foster care system, or who has attained 16 years of age and left foster care for kinship guardianship or adoption; a child eligible for assistance under sec. 477 of the Social Security Act), or in an out-of-home placement;

- (7) An individual who is pregnant or parenting;
- (8) An individual with a disability;
- (9) A low-income individual who requires additional assistance to enter or complete an educational program or to secure or hold employment. (20 CFR 681.210)
